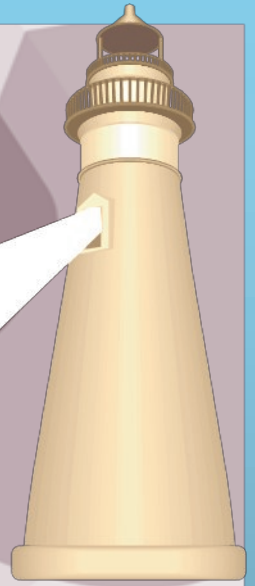

Meeting minutes 2/5/2014

Chairman Devore started the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. Introductions were done by all members in attendance.

Secretary report and Treasurer Report for Jan 2014 were held over until the March meeting.

Darrell Clifton RVP said National dues are due along with Local Chapter dues and that only 80% of national members renew their membership.

Al Zajic discussed the Security Professional of the Year award program and said nominations are ready to be received. He indicated anyone nominated last year that wasn't selected and are nominated again must fill out a new form.

The member from DHS discussed the Active Shooter Seminar coming up on April 22, 2014 and will be held at Circus Circus. He also said training will be coming on IED awareness and bomb situations.

Brian Markowski discussed the cyber security awareness seminar that is coming up; flyers are available at the sign in table.

Austin Bharadwaja discussed the possibility of having a library of reference materials for members to check out. A motion by Brian Markowski and seconded by Chris Brockway to establish a library, a discussion was held and Al Zajic motioned we have a study done by two or three members to determine how to implement and maintain a library for the Chapter and to report at the next meeting. Seconded by Dean Hill. Austin and Brian to review the idea and report at the March meeting. Motion carried.

Chairman Devore recognized Dean Hill for his work on the Law Enforcement Appreciation luncheon and made a motion to recognize the civilian of the year who works for a law enforcement agency at the next LEA, seconded by Dean Hill, motion carried.

Chairman Devore introduced the guest speaker Ira Victor a digital forensic analyst. Ira discussed data security and gave examples of the difference from data and physical security. He said the challenge is trying to understand something that is not tangible. We don't normally think of things in the abstract and many things are just simple.

He explained that weak passwords and two factor authentication are really important but simple things. Ira said the bad guys know data security is weak and exploit it. He continued saying not much is done in the preplanning for data security. Ira said most companies are ill prepared for attacks on data. Companies need to start with standards i.e. ISO 22K and plan, test, and be audited by an independent auditor. He also discussed data logs and the fact that no one reviews them. He indicated there are software programs that review data logs that alert when unauthorized users are attempting to get in.



Chairman Devore conducted the raffle and closed the meeting.

- Communicating with and accounting for employees;
- Building familiarity with local responders and knowing their capabilities;
- Coordinating with first responders before, during, and after an incident; and
- Integrating public affairs into incident management.

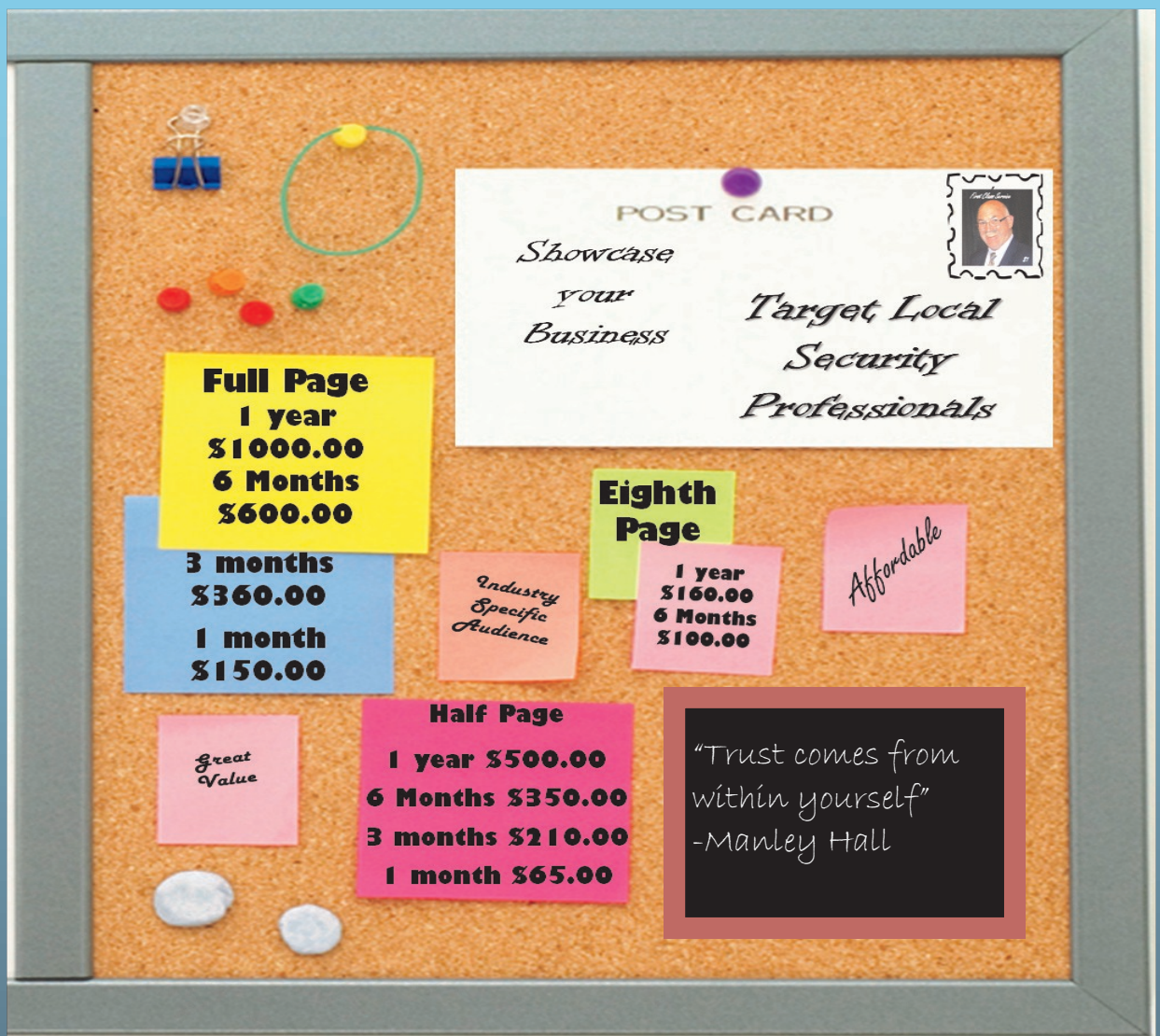

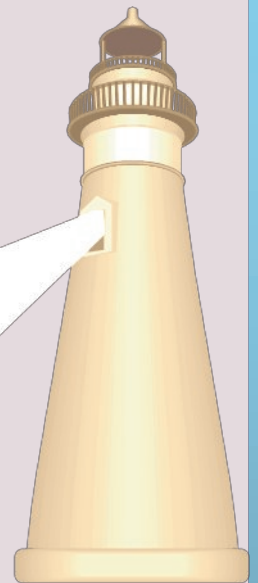
